"Regimes of Ethnicity: A Global Database of Ethnic Demography and Survey of State Policies on Ethnicity" is a project aimed at, first, creating a database by gathering the most up to date information on the ethnic demography of the 172 countries in the world with a population over 250,000; and second, conducting an expert survey of state policies on ethnicity in these countries in order to gauge the relationship between ethnicity and nationality as reflected in state policies.

It is hoped that the database of global ethnic demography thus compiled will be a major improvement over the current databases, five of the most reputable ones you can find below. The second part of this survey asks one question each on 15 different policy areas, which gauge the institutionalization of ethnicity in a given country. The first part of the survey has a single question, where you are asked to agree or disagree with, or suggest better sources for, the ethnic demographic data collected by the researcher and provided as part of the survey.

Results may be made available online in order to facilitate the dissemination of accurate information on ethnic demography and state policies on ethnicity around the world, and to receive feedback on the data and the survey results from the wider public and the scholarly community. 


Fig. 1: Ethnic Structure of Taiwan
